General Application Process

- Contact registered apprenticeship program for application process
- Submit documents including application, resume, letters of recommendation, certifications/licenses, transcripts if required
- Complete testing if required
- In-person interview
- Placed in pool of eligible applicants
- Enter apprenticeship or contact program every month to remain on list

Earn and Learn

What is Registered Apprenticeship?

Registered Apprenticeship is an “Earn and Learn” model that provides you with a unique, combination of job related technical instruction and on the job training experience. It’s all about learning while doing, and learning from experts in the industry. Registered apprenticeships provide you with the training necessary to develop advanced skills for high-paying, in-demand jobs in your chosen industry.



Program Length

Registered apprenticeship programs vary in length from one to six years. Each year of training generally consists of 2,000 hours on the job and 144 hours of related technical instruction.

College Degree Pathway

Many programs earn college credit for their job-related technical instruction through South Seattle College and other local community and technical colleges.

- Apprentices pay 50% of the cost of tuition
- Employers may cover the cost of tuition
- Credits may be applied to Associate of Applied Science Degree in Multi-Occupational Trades

Veterans

Eligible veterans may use GI Bill program benefits for apprenticeship training. Payment amount varies depending on the program. Visit goo.gl/qcuVwe to learn more.

Eligibility

General Requirements

- 18 years or older
- High School Diploma or GED
- Physically able to perform work of the trade

Potential Requirements

- Testing for math or English
- Proof of citizenship/employment eligibility
- Valid Driver’s License
- Clean drug test
- Reliable transportation
